GO FOR BOLD AT YOUR COOKIE BOOTH



Cookie Booth Season is in full swing and we have 10 top tips that will help you have the best cookie booth season yet!

- 1. Open a box of cookies (your troop will have to pay for that one) and break cookies into small samples.
- 2. Give away a large zip-top freezer bag with multi-box purchases. Tell your customers they freeze great!
- 3. Always tell your customers about your goals. Hang up signs or wear a goal t-shirt, and tell them how you plan to use the money you earn.
- 4. Make sure customers know they can buy cookies for you to donate. Make signs that tell where your troop is donating cookies this year. Create a drop box so customers can see the donated cookies stacking up!
- 5. With ribbons, tie up packages to create bundles, encouraging customers to buy more.
- 6. Print out Girl Scout cookie recipes (we have a ton on our <u>Pinterest</u>) and offer one free when they buy more than one package.
- 7. Have exciting posters, sing songs or play a recording to catch attention. Use bright colors, have a theme, dress to impress (uniforms, cookie costumes, fit with your theme).
- 8. Show off your goal poster to show customers how you are doing on reaching your goal.
- 9. Promote last chance. Booth sales are the last time to buy cookies. Tell your customers so they know they'll be gone soon.
- 10. Share your product recommendations with your customers.

CHECK OUT THESE G.I.R.L.S! Dwy googs foor good

Recently, Manitou Council Girl Scout Ivy earned the prestigious Girl Scout Gold Award, the



highest National Award a Girl Scout can earn. Ivy's Gold Award project focused on menstrual equity. She worked to have free feminine hygiene products available in bathrooms at Fond du Lac High School, as well as creating take-home bags of supplies for teens in need outside of school. Ivy was inspired by both personal experience and a larger view of the social impact of access to menstrual products.

"I've personally needed menstrual products at school, put money in the machines and had them not work. Products were available in the office, but that's a long walk from most school bathrooms - we don't make students walk to the office for toilet paper. Pads and tampons are no different," said Ivy.

She hopes the project will open a larger, continuing conversation. She wants people to understand that there is nothing shameful about menstruation; that it is a normal part of life. She thinks what is shameful is when students have to miss class time due to lack of access to products.

"We have a fairly significant poverty rate in our school disctrict based on free and reduced lunch data so getting these necessary health products can come at a real cost to our community's families. We can't treat tampons and pads as a luxury. They are not something people who menstruate can do without," said Ivy.

While Ivy officially completed her project in October, she plans to continue to work to keep the project going. So far, Ivy has gathered more than 7,500 donated pads and tampons. Ivy is working to ensure the already donated supplies make it into bathrooms after her graduation. She also still welcomes donations (contact <u>fondymenstrualequity@gmail.com</u>). Ivy is talking to the school district administration about ways to keep funding the product supply for years to come.

"The concept of 'menstrual equity' is what has driven me. Equity means access for all who need them. Equity means the products are where students need them, the bathroom. This equity needs to drive all of us to empower our students and give them necessary resources," Ivy said. "Ideally, I would like free products available in the district middle school bathrooms too. Many younger students need them as well."

Manitou Council had another Girl Scout earn her Gold Award this fall. Caleigh's Gold



Award project was focused on building a dog park in her community. Caleigh noticed that in her community, dogs were running free where there aren't a lot of sidewalks or safe places where dogs and their owners can enjoy the community. Caleigh believes the lack of safe places for dogs suggests a mentality of carelessness, and she wanted to tackle this root cause of the issue. And then her idea of Amicus Dog Park was born.

Amicus Dog Park also positively impacted the community by introducing youth to civic engagement and showing them that anyone can make a difference. Throughout the process, Caleigh worked with three younger Girl Scout troops to plant trees on the park site and help them learn about the environment.

Her project impacted many individiduals: some who supported it and others who did not. She dealt with problems and conflicts like neighboring baseball fields, safety, moving the site of her dog park, concerns from neighbors, and grade of fencing. She spoke at township meetings, public hearings, local businesses and organizations, and two local high schools, and spoke with many news reporters, TV reporters, and created a Facebook page, all to stand up for and promote her project and the importance of it. "This project has truly impacted my life in many ways. I have gained a stronger will that has helped me 'stick to my guns' for my project and my ethics," said Caleigh.

Caleigh worked for over 120 hours and raised over \$10,000 to turn her idea into reality. Caleigh's determination shows that girls can do anything. If you aren't quite old enough to earn your Gold Award yet, work on earning your Bronze or Silver Awards! These highest awards will show you are determined to make a change in the world.

RAISING AWESOME GIRLS: RAISE HER TO BE A STEMINIST

You know how some say it's a man's world? Well, when it comes to science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) fields, where women make up less than a quarter of the workforce, that's still the case. And considering roughly 80% of mid-level jobs involve STEM, we need to catch girls up, quick.

"Not every girl is going to want to pursue a career in STEM, and it's important to encourage her to follow her own passions," says Girl Scouts' developmental

psychologist Dr. Andrea Bastiani Archibald, "but every girl should be encouraged to try her hand at STEM skills, get comfortable with those concepts, and learn how they apply to all kinds of surprising fields - from fashion, to finance, and beyond."

- 1. Set the right tone at home
- 2. Give her some strong STEMinists to look up to
- 3. Find the STEM side of her interests

STEM SPOT: 3D DRAWING


Let's learn how to draw a 3D image! It's super easy and you'll have fun creating your own 3D drawing. Here's what you'll need:

- 3. Use a hole punch to place a hole in your bookmark near the top. Thread some embroidery floss through the hole. You can braid it, knot it, or add some beads.
- 4. Since the back is plain cardboard, design it however you'd like. Unleash your inner artist!

Triple Toffee-tastic[®] Cake (Gluten-free)

Ready in 1½–2 hours

What you need:

<u>3-Layer Cake</u> (or use store bought mix)

- DRY: 4 1/2 cups gluten-free all purpose flour
 - 2 3/4 cups granulated sugar
 - 2 tablespoons baking powder
 - 1 teaspoons baking soda
 - OPTION: 1 envelope (1.3 oz) of dry whipped topping mix for an extra moist cake
- WET: 12 egg whites (or to make a yellow cake,
 - use 6 eggs), at room temperature
 - 1 cup vegetable oil
 - 3 tablespoons white vinegar
 - 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
 - 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 1/2 cups of milk of choice, at room temperature
- 6-8 Toffee-tastic[®] cookies

Buttercream Frosting

- 1 1/2 cups unsalted butter, softened
- 4 1/2 cups powdered sugar, sifted
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 3–5 tablespoons milk of your choice

<u>Toffee Sauce</u>

1 cup light brown sugar 1/2 cup heavy cream 1/2 cup unsalted butter 1 teaspoons vanilla Pinch of salt

Toffee Bits (or use store bought bits)

1/2 cup unsalted butter 1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons water Pinch of salt

Makes 16–18 servings

Directions:

1. Make your 3-layer cake (or prepare store bought cake mix) Preheat oven to 350? Oil three 8" or 9" round cake pans. Combine all the wet ingredients in a large bowl, except for the milk. Beat well until frothy. In another bowl, sift together all the dry ingredients. Slowly mix the dry mix into the wet, and alternate adding milk to keep mix mixture wet. Beat at medium speed just until the batter is smooth. Do not over mix.

Pour batter into the 3 prepared pans and rest for 15 minutes. Bake for 30-35 minutes. Test with a toothpick before removing from oven. The toothpick should come out of cakes clean when inserted into the center. Cool on a wire rack. To remove the cakes, gently flip each cake upside down onto your hand, remove the pan, then return the cake to the rack.

2. Prepare delicious toffee bits

Place all ingredients in a medium saucepan and bring to boil over medium high heat (about 5 minutes). Do not stir. Continue cooking for about 8 more minutes, until the mixture reaches 300° or begins to turn brown. Do not stir during any of this time. Pour onto a parchment paper lined baking sheet and spread thin. Do not touch as it is very, very hot. Allow to cool. Place into plastic bag and break the bits into pieces.

3. Whip up buttercream frosting

In a bowl beat butter until creamy. Add the sugar and mix until light and fluffy. Add the vanilla. Add milk until a smooth spreading consistency.

4. Make toffee sauce, just before you are ready to assemble cake. Place the sugar, cream and butter in a small saucepan. Bring everything to boil, then reduce the heat to a simmer. Stir with a wooden spoon for about 3-4 minutes or until it thickens. Let it cool until desired consistency is reached.

5. Assemble your Triple Toffee-tastic[®] Cake

Level each cake with a sharp knife. Put first layer onto serving plate, top with toffee sauce, generous frosting and toffee bits. Repeat for second layer. Put on top layer, generously frost the top and skim coat the sides. Pour sauce over cake, allowing to drip down the sides. Decorate with frosting, cookies and bits!
