- **Promote Explorermores!** People love trying new things. Tell everyone about the new Explorermores cookie and encourage them to purchase a box to try them out!
- **Power up your posters!** Make them stand out. Use big letters, fun colors, and bold designs.
- **Make it sing.** Using catchy songs or music will attract some attention as potential customers walk by. Play a recording or sing some classic Girl Scout camp songs.
- **Use bright colors.** You'll stand out! Who wouldn't stop and look at your booth with bright yellow or orange catching their eye.
- **Pick a theme.** People will notice your creativity and want to stop by. Carnival, circus, superheroes, girl power, animals – the sky is the limit.





## Raising Awesome Girls

## Help Her be a Force for Good Online



It's always important to model kindness and empathy to our kids — especially online! From navigating social media to cyberbullying, parenting in the digital age is definitely complicated. The good news is that you can play a big role in teaching your girl the power of spreading positivity. The message is plain and simple: it's cool to be kind.

Here are five ways you can teach your girl to lead with kindness online:

- 1. Be kind online.** The golden rule applies online just as much as in-person: treat others how you'd like to be treated! Teach your girl that being kind and respectful to others online makes the internet far more positive and safe for everyone. Talk to your girl about how she might

feel angry, sad, or embarrassed if someone said or wrote something mean about her online. Since she doesn't want to feel that way, she should do her best to ensure she doesn't make anyone else feel that way. Talking with her about which comments or content are positive and which are negative will empower her to make good choices.

**2. Set a good example.** Your girl is a leader who can model kindness online! Let her know that she has the power to lead by example. Help your girl develop skills to take a leadership role online. Show her how to communicate respectfully and kindly in the digital world and in real life by modeling these behaviors yourself. Treat others with empathy in your digital interactions, whether on social media or over email. Encourage her to create and share content that uplifts and inspires others. Whether it's sharing achievements, creative projects, or kind messages, promoting positivity online will create a ripple effect. When she leads by example, she'll also support her friends in making good choices.

If her friends and peers see her spreading positivity online, they'll be more likely to do the same. Kindness is contagious!

**3. Stand up to cyberbullies.** Unfortunately, bullies can be anywhere — especially in the digital world. Cyberbullying can take many forms, including insults, threats, and spreading rumors. By helping her gain the confidence to stand up to bullies, you'll give her skills she can use throughout life when conflicts arise. If someone is being unkind or making her uncomfortable, encourage her to talk to the person calmly and directly if it is safe to do so. This conversation could lead to a resolution. If this doesn't work, help her handle the situation online by blocking, muting, or unfollowing people who are mean-spirited or who demonstrate inappropriate behavior. Of course, if there's any threat of violence, remind her to come to you or a trusted adult for help instead of trying to deal with the situation alone. Help her recognize the signs of bullying and the importance of standing up for herself and others. Encourage her to speak up and report online bullying.

**4. Stop harmful or untrue information.** Most of us have heard untrue information shared about us at some point. Rumors hurt us all. The best way to teach your girl to recognize and challenge false information is by making her aware that people and situations online aren't always what they seem. Discerning between what's real and fake is a lesson in digital safety. Help guide her in determining if information is true and reliable, and what isn't. Before she shares information she hears online, she should first consider where the information came from. Is the person the information came from reliable, or have they spread rumors in the past? Can anyone else help her verify that what's being said is true? Ask her how she'd feel if someone spread false information about her online. Let her know she can call out this behavior if directed at her or other people if it is safe to do so.

**5. Think before you share.** Once things are on the internet, they may be hard to erase, as a digital footprint follows us everywhere. Just like we should think before speaking, we should be thoughtful before sharing online, commenting, or communicating with others. If it isn't kind to say, it isn't kind to post. Remind her to ask herself, "How would I feel if someone said this to or about me?" and "Is this a positive comment?" Teach her the importance of keeping private information safe and secure online, and work together to create guidelines about what information is and isn't appropriate to share.

## Cookie Proceeds Help Rebuild Homes



For most, watching a wildfire destroy your community would leave you feeling overwhelmed, heartbroken, and maybe even unsure of what to do next. But Girl Scouts aren't most people.

After the Almeda Fire ravaged the Rogue Valley area near Medford, Oregon in September 2020, the members of Troop 30021 asked how they could help rebuild homes. This was despite several troop members being displaced after evacuations forced them to leave their homes and one troop member even losing their home to the fire.

"After the 2020 Almeda wildfire decimated the community where most of our girls live, they really wanted to help rebuild homes," said troop leader Dena. "We reached out to Habitat [for Humanity] and although they couldn't physically participate due to their age, they decided to help by giving 100% of their earnings towards the homes that would be built for families displaced by the fire."

With the decision made, the troop set their sales goal for the year and went to work selling cookies. The troop later attended an event and were able to present a check for \$2,500. The event marked the beginning of rebuilding homes for two families displaced by the wildfire.

"We were able to meet the people from Habitat, the families, and the mayor," said Dena. "This particular wall raising was very emotional for every person there. There wasn't a dry eye in the house."

Attending the event was also a chance for the Girl Scouts to see their work during the cookie program pay off. "It was an honor to be able to attend and present our check," said Dena. "It gave the girls a sense of pride and accomplishment. They were able to see what their hard work and efforts were able to provide for their community."

Setting goals and working hard is nothing new for Troop 30021. Most of the troop members have been together since they were Daisies and have participated in the Girl Scout Cookie Program every year. "One of the reasons it's important for our troop to participate is the valuable life-long skills they are learning, from managing money to keeping track of inventory, and people skills," said Dena. "The cookie program has also been a way for our troop to earn money that allows us to help our community and to go on fun adventures."


Their next adventure funded by cookie proceeds? A trip to Paris.



# STEM Spot: Candle Carousel

Candle carousels date back to the 1800s and originated in Germany. They are thought to have been inspired by windmills. Today, candle carousels are found around the world as decorations. Let's make our own!

## Materials Needed:

- Scissors
- Kitchen foil
- Playdough

- Wooden skewer
- Heatproof plate
- Small candles

## Follow These Steps:

1. Fold a sheet of kitchen foil in half and trim it to make a square about 15cm x 15cm.
2. Mark the central point of the square.
3. Fold the foil in half and then open it up again.
4. Fold the foil in half the other way and open up again.
5. Fold diagonally both ways and open up again.
6. Carefully cut along each fold line to about 1cm from the central point.
7. Fold a triangle shape along each cut line and half-fold it up to create tilted blades.
8. Place a ball of playdough onto the heatproof plate and push it down.
9. Stick the skewer into the playdough and balance the foil spinner on the top.
10. Place candles around the skewer.
11. Light the candles and watch as the foil spins!
12. Make it an investigation! Change something and make a prediction about what will happen.  
Examples: Change the shape or angle of the blades, experiment with more or fewer candles, change the position of the candles.

## The Science Behind It:

The heat from the burning candles warms the air above them. Hot air is less dense than cold air and rises upwards, creating a current as the warm air rises, cools, and falls. The hot air current pushes on the tilted blades, pushing them sideways. This creates a rotating force making the carousel spin.

# Craft Craze: Digital Cookie Bracelet

## QR code wearable

With this activity, Girl Scouts will make it easy for customers to scan, pay, and even bookmark their Digital Cookie link. There's also space to include a personal goal. Customers are often motivated to help Girl Scouts reach their goals.

### Supplies:

- Template
- Tape
- Scissors
- Markers

### Instructions:

1. Girl Scouts can write their goal in the “My Goal” circle.
2. Color bracelets.
3. Print out and add the Digital Cookie® QR code to center space.
4. Cut along dotted lines.
5. Tape ends to secure the bracelet.

# Tasty Treats: Samoas Dream Cake



## Samoas® Dream Cake

Ready in 1 1/2-2 hours  
Serves 8



### What you need

#### Ingredients

##### Cake

1 box yellow cake mix  
1 can store bought caramel frosting

##### Coconut Caramel Filling

1 cup heavy cream  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 egg yolk, slightly beaten  
1 stick of butter  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 cups sweetened coconut flakes  
1 box Samoas®

##### Chocolate Ganache

1 cup heavy cream  
2 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons sugar  
10 oz. chocolate chips  
6 1/2 tablespoons milk

##### Bottom and Sides

2 boxes of Samoas®

##### Equipment

Large mixing bowl  
Three 8" round pans  
Medium sauce pan  
Whisk  
10" spring-form cake pan  
Parchment paper  
Cookie sheet (optional)

### Directions

#### 1. Bake cake:

Mix and bake cake according to manufacturer's instructions using three 8" pans.

#### 2. Make caramel mix:

To prepare the coconut caramel, mix brown sugar, egg yolk, cream and vanilla. Melt butter in a sauce pan then add mixture. Cook mixture over medium heat until it boils for one minute — stirring often with a wire whisk. Remove from heat and stir in 2 cups sweetened coconut flakes. Chill mixture in refrigerator.

#### 3. Prepare cake pan:

Line a 10" spring-form cake pan with parchment paper. Chop one box of Samoas and press into bottom of the spring-form pan. Sprinkle 2 ounces of chocolate chips over chopped cookies, place in the oven until chocolate chips melt. Using the back of a spoon, spread chocolate over cookie crumbs as evenly as possible.

#### 4. First layer:

Place first layer of cake on top of melted chocolate and crumbs. Spread half of coconut caramel filling over cake. Place second layer of cake in pan and top with remaining filling. Place third layer of cake in pan. Remove sides of pan and spread caramel icing over top and sides of cake. Chill cake while preparing chocolate ganache.

#### 5. Make chocolate ganache:

Prepare the chocolate ganache by melting butter and cream in the top of a double boiler until it is about the consistency of bottled creamy salad dressing — thin enough to pour, but thick enough to coat the top of the cake without running off.

#### 6. Pouring ganache on cake:

Place cake on cooling rack with a cookie sheet (preferably with sides) underneath. Pour chocolate ganache on to the middle of the cake. Encourage it to roll over the sides of the cake with a palette knife, spatula, or the back of a spoon. Cover the cake as evenly as possible while trying to minimize the strokes used — the less strokes you use the smoother the finish will be.

#### 7. Decorating the cake:

Chop the second box of cookies and press onto the sides of the cake. Chill cake and remaining ganache in refrigerator. If desired, slide cake off parchment paper and spring-form pan bottom using a long spatula.

#### 8. Final touches:

Finish the cake with piped rosettes of ganache and cut cookies or other fanciful decorations such as butterflies, honeybees, birds, etc. Using tinted icing. Dream big!
